M. A. History (2023 Pattern) Syllabus

General Information:

- The M.A. degree will be awarded to students who complete a total of 88 credits in a minimum of two years as per the structure of this degree.
- A Student may elect up to four credits from any other departments per semester. In case a student wishes to take all courses from the parent department they may also do so.
- Mandatory as well as Elective courses are open to all students from outside the department. Eligibility for registering for each course will be decided by the departmental committee.

Evaluation

- Each course will have 50% marks as semester end examination and 50% marks for internal assessment.
- The student has to pass in the combined total of internal assessment and semester end examination.
- In order to pass a student shall have to get minimum 40% marks (P and above on grade point scale) in each course. Any student getting less than 15 marks in each component will be declared as failed, even if the combined total is over 40%.
- If a student misses an internal assessment examination they will have a second chance in the same semester with the permission of the teacher concerned. Students who have failed for the entire course may reappear for the semester-end exam. Their internal marks will not change.
- They can also repeat during the 5th /the 6th semester whichever is applicable

Course Title: Research Project

This is a course that grooms the Master students towards an orientation in historical research. The course is based on the interaction between the mentor and the research student. Considering the unique nature of each research project, these interactions are to be treated as contact hours. The students are expected to have completed a course on Research Methodology and a Field Project earlier. Consequently, there will be no classroom lectures for the Research Project Courses.

Course Description: The students are expected to complete the research project in this semester. They present the research outline in a poster form at the beginning. Then they complete the analytical operations and submit the progress report. This is followed by the concluding operations which are submitted in the form of a pre-submission report.

The Semester End Assessment includes the final submission of their research project report. This report is assessed by the mentor (25 marks) as well as by an external expert (25 marks) assigned by the Department. The Viva-Voce (25 Marks) is conducted before the Departmental Research Committee.
